History of the Chatham-Kent Metal Detecting Club

Five years ago if someone was interested in metal detecting here in Chatham-Kent and wanted to meet other people interested in the hobby, they would have to travel an hour to Windsor, Sarnia, or London. There were a group of people that would occasionally travel to Windsor to meet at the SunParlour Treasure Seekers. These individuals enjoyed the Windsor club but found the travel to be too much, especially during the winter months and so grew the idea to have meetings here in Chatham. The first unofficial meeting of metal detector enthusiasts was held on January 30, 2003 at the home of Vince and Kathy Gagnier. There were seven people at this meeting:

Marcel Van Hintum, Dennis Warwick, Fritz Enzlin, Vince Gagnier, Phil Szucs, Frank Vadovic and Kathy Gagnier

Different ideas were discussed at this meeting including the possibility for a club name. Two ideas were, White Horse of Kent and CKMD (Chatham-Kent Metal Detectorists).

Suggested club dues were \$10.00 for the year and a suggested meeting date and time being the last Thursday of each month at 7:00 p.m. Also discussed were the positions the club would have being a President, Vice-President and Secretary/Treasurer. A "Find of the Month" Contest was discussed and also the possibility for a club hunt in the Spring.

The Second unofficial meeting of metal detector enthusiasts was held on February 27, 2003 at the home of Vince and Kathy Gagnier in Chatham. First discussions were on club logos. The group liked the maple leaf design but thought it a bit outdated. Ideas were discussed to have the words "Maple City" in the club's title but it was turned down. White horse was brought up again but disagreed upon because no one was familiar with the horse. Marcel Van Hintum felt *Chatham-Kent Metal Detecting Club* was a good name for the club as it explained what the group does, makes sense, and tells of the hobby. Many individuals didn't like the words *treasure seekers* as there is so much more to the club. Ideas for a logo were to have two detectors crossed but was agreed that we needed an easily identifiable logo. Thus the name for the club was decided and agreed upon by the individuals as **CHATHAM-KENT METAL DETECTING CLUB** with a simple flamed leaf as its logo.

Next was talk about the club's positions with individuals voting on Marcel VanHintum being the club's 1st official President, Frank Vadovic the Vice-President and Kathy Gagnier as the Secretary/Treasurer. The club was now **OFFICIAL!** These members met once again at Tim Hortons on March 20, 2003 to prepare for the first real meeting. A place was found for the meeting, Phil Szucs was nominated Web Designer, the membership fee was raised to \$15 for individual and \$20 for family, and a 50/50 draw would take place. Thus the **CHATHAM-KENT METAL DETECTING CLUB** was formed and on Thursday, March 27, 2003 the first official meeting took place at the CAW Local 127 Hall, on 280 Merrit St. in Chatham. There were 12 individuals present including the executives.

This brings us to 2008. The club is still going strong with over 30 members and growing. The club has gained many members that have added great ideas and camaraderie to the club and made it a great success. Since 2003 our club has been in the paper numerous times, made donations to local charities, and has been a meeting ground for members to discuss and participate in their favourite pastimes. We have come a long way!

The G.A.R. was founded in 1866 by Benjamin Stephenson MD as a fraternal organization for veterans of the Union Army in the US civil war. It was styled after the Masons and had a military type uniform. They were influential in starting the Decoration Day holliday which evolved into Memorial Day (May 30). In 1881 they started the Sons of Union Vets which replaced the G.A.R. in 1956 when the last vet died.

The G.A.R. held a National Encampment annually from 1866 to 1949. The 1891 Encampment was held in DETROIT MICHIGAN.
